- On December 17th at 6pm there will be Menorah Lighting in the Town Center next to Town Hall at 468 Main Street.


The Town is also hard at work finalizing the budget recommendations that will be presented at the May 2026 Annual Town Meeting. Later this month we will be publishing the Town Manager's Recommended Municipal Budget for the Select Board and Finance Committee to consider.



FIRE DEPARTMENT

DECOMMISSIONING OF THE MUNICIPAL FIRE ALARM SYSTEM

Originally installed decades ago, the municipal fire alarm box system allowed residents to report fires by pulling a lever on a red street- or building-mounted box, which sent a telegraph signal directly to the fire department. Widely used throughout the 19th and 20th centuries, these systems have largely been replaced by enhanced 911 networks. Each alarm box was connected to a central office through telegraph circuits. When activated, the box transmitted a coded signal identifying its location, enabling dispatchers to alert the appropriate fire companies. Street boxes were publicly accessible, while master boxes—located in schools, factories, and municipal buildings—automatically transmitted alarms from internal fire alarm systems.

These systems were valued for their speed, reliability, and ability to automatically identify the alarm's location. However, they lacked voice communication, were susceptible to false alarms, and required extensive maintenance. Today, nearly all emergency calls are received through the 911 system, which provides real-time voice communication, GPS location, and detailed information for responders. Modern central monitoring stations can now transmit building alarm signals that specify the exact location and type of activation (such as smoke, heat, or sprinkler flow), further improving response accuracy and efficiency.

While the municipal fire alarm system played a vital role in the pre-telephone era, its use has steadily declined. Acton's system, installed in 1930 by Earl Hayward, began with a connection from South Acton Square to the Woolen Mill at 53 River Street and eventually expanded to more than 450 boxes.

Beginning this fall, and over the next two to three years, the Town of Acton will decommission its municipal fire alarm system due to obsolete technology, increasing maintenance costs, frequent false alarms, vandalism, and redundancy with modern 911 and building alarm systems. The process will start with street boxes, followed by master boxes, allowing property owners time to make necessary adjustments.

For residents, **911** remains the primary method for reporting fire or medical emergencies, and most residents do not need to take any action.

Property owners with direct connections to the fire alarm system have been notified and advised on the necessary upgrades

How Fire Departments Benefit from Next Generation 911

Next Generation 911-related technologies will provide new opportunities to keep firefighters and communities safer. The following scenarios provide a non-technical depiction of how new technologies will provide information leaders need to ensure safe, efficient and effective responses to a variety of incidents.

More Accurate Scene Information

NG911 will allow dispatchers to receive video and photos from victims and bystanders at the scene, providing more vital pre-arrival information. Environmental conditions – such as area density – and other details such as smoke color and structure involvement will help identify the appropriate response.

Redundancy & Multi-Agency Interoperability

During a natural disaster or other large-scale emergency, the NG911 system protects against call overload by re-routing calls, texts and data to alternative call centers. The system also allows for better coordination with first responders, allowing for better coordination between other emergency services and agencies.



Accurate Pre-Arrival Data

Monitoring technology worn by patients will automatically alert 911 within seconds of a medical event. Pre-arrival responder access to time-sensitive patient and incident information will help improve patient outcomes and survival.



Improved Firefighter Safety

New and emerging technologies in the NG911 environment will provide information to improve firefighter safety. Dispatch can access building sensors and video feeds, helping to identify hazardous materials or potential victim location. Other technologies will provide more precise caller, responder and resource location accuracy.




Better Crash Data

Telematics, now integrated into many vehicles, notify 911 with precise location information and crucial details like speed at impact, airbag deployment, number of occupants, seatbelt use and more. This data, available at dispatch, helps fire services prepare appropriate equipment and provides medical key information to plan for transport to the appropriate hospital or trauma center.



SALT SMARTLY

FOR CLEAN PATHS, CLEAN DRAINS, & CLEAN WATER

Shovel as soon as possible. Before applying road salt, clear snow & break up ice. Less ice will form & less salt will be needed!



Use salt according to instructions - a little goes a long way! Once snow & ice is melted, sweep up excess salt for reuse.



Make sure storm drains are clear & free of snow & debris. When piling snow, avoid areas near storm drains. Instead, use vegetated areas where melted snow can soak into the ground.

Everyday Neighborliness

Introduce yourself and exchange phone numbers with nearby neighbors. Offer help with errands, rides, or small tasks.

- Share community news, resources, and upcoming events. Respect differences, listen with kindness, and look out for one another.

In Times of Emergencies

Please check in on neighbors who may need extra support (older adults, people living alone, families with young children, or residents with health concerns).

Heat Advisory: Check on elderly neighbors, those with chronic health conditions, and families without AC.

Severe Winter Storms: Make sure neighbors have heat, food, and medication. Offer to shovel, help with groceries, or share storm updates.

Power Outages: Share flashlights, phone chargers, or a warm place to stay if safe to do so.

General Safety: If something doesn't seem right, check in or call for help.

Remember: Being a good neighbor doesn't require big gestures, even a quick check-in can make a huge difference!





Take action to stop respiratory viruses from spoiling holiday cheer



Stay at home.

If you are sick, stay home to avoid putting others at risk. You should also avoid others in the household to lessen their risk. If you have severe or worsening symptoms, call your healthcare provider.



Clean your hands.

Handwashing often with soap removes most germs, including respiratory viruses, from your hands.

If soap and water are not available, using a hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol can kill many germs.

Cover your mouth and nose.

Cover your mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing. Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth. Germs spread easily this way.



Get Vaccinated.

Vaccination is the most important step you can take to protect yourself and your loved ones.



Many viruses spread more during the holiday season, so it is important to get all recommended vaccines, including flu, COVID-19 and RSV, as soon as possible.

Wear a mask.

Masks can help reduce the spread of respiratory viruses. Wearing a high-quality mask while you travel, for example, can help protect you and others.



Improve Air Quality

Viral particles in the air spread between people more easily indoors than outdoors.



Any way you can improve air quality, such as opening windows or using air purifiers, can help reduce the amount of virus you are exposed to.

SUBDIVISION RULES & REGULATIONS

Planning Board Meeting - 12/16 - 7:05PM
in Room 204 of Acton Town Hall or on Zoom

Last May, Town Meeting voters overwhelmingly approved a zoning amendment that made cluster development the default method of subdivision in Acton, meaning all new subdivisions are required to preserve 60% of the land as Resource Land. Join us on 12/16 to provide input on amending Acton's Subdivision Rules and Regulations, which are complementary to the zoning. They specify design criteria and certain technical standards. This is the final step in the 'Habitat For All' initiative!




